

# **Twelfth Grade English 1**

# **Course Description**

In this course students read many of the great works of literature from the Anglo-Saxon period through the eighteenth century. They gain an understanding of the development of English literature as they study Shakespeare's *Othello*, and selections from *Beowulf*, *The Canterbury Tales*, and *Paradise Lost*. Students work on improving their writing skills by preparing papers and presentations that analyze the literary works.

# **Course Objectives**

- 8. Evaluate William Shakespeare as both a poet and a playwright.
- 9. Summarize the plot of Othello.
- 10. Identify the elements of dramatic tragedy in a play.
- 11. Examine the effect of the Puritan cause on British literature.
- 12. Compare the writings of John Milton and John Bunyan.
- 13. Explore works from the Restoration era and eighteenth century.
- 14. Contrast characteristics of Neoclassical literature and Romantic literature.
- 15. Define the concept of *carpe diem* and explain its significance in literature.
- 16. Find meaning in different literary genres, including diaries, essays, allegories, historic fiction, satire, and biographies.
- 17. Support and defend personal interpretations of literary works.

18. Express your own ideas in written and oral communications.
