

American Government 1: Theories, Policies and Politics

Course Description

Students analyze the American federal system of government as outlined by the Constitution of the United States. They study state and local government and examine the structures of the 50 state governments. The constitutional rights guaranteed to American citizens, as well as the relationship of citizens to states, are discussed in detail.

- 14. Explore the impact of mass media on the political process.
- 15. Define each type of interest group.
- 16. Consider the impact that interest groups have in a democracy.
- 17. Differentiate between presidential and parliamentary forms of democracy.
- 18. Compare capitalist, mixed, socialist, and communist economies.
- 19. Express personal opinions about political issues.
