

AP[®] Comparative Government and Politics

Course Description

This course teaches students the tools and methods that political scientists use to analyze governments in different countries. Students apply these techniques while exploring the political systems of Britain, Russia, China, Mexico, Iran, Nigeria, and the United States. While learning about the structures and functions of government in each of these countries, students also evaluate how the trends of globalization, democratization, and marketization are influencing countries around the world. The course will prepare students for the College Board AP® Comparative Government and Politics examination and is intended for students who have an in-depth interest in world affairs. Students are NOT required to take the College Board® examination to receive credit for the course from UNHS.

Course Objectives

- 2.Apply qualitative and quantitative research methods in the study of political systems.
- 3.Understand subjective and objective analysis of political situations.
- 4. Identify political attitudes.
- 5.Discuss political ideologies.
- 6.Summarize the historic development of modern states.
- 7.Assess the government, regime, institutions, and political systems of a state.
- 8.Evaluate the processes and policies of different states' regimes.
- 9.Determine where a country falls on the balance of freedom and equality.
- 10.Contrast the systems, principles, institutions, processes, policies, and behaviors of democratic countries with those of non-democratic ones.
- 11.Compare the systems, principles, institutions, processes, policies, and behaviors of developing countries, and compare those countries to developed ones.
- 12.Use maps, charts, statistics, and other data to analyze different countries.
- 13.Interpret text-based sources relating to comparative politics.

14.Develop your own views about political matters.

15.Defend and support your own political views and interpretations in essay format.
