# **Course Description**

This course traces the major historical developments in the United States from 1900 to the present. Students examine the causes and effects of the Industrial Revolution, immigration, reform movements, the two world wars and other historical phenomena that have influenced American society since the Civil War. Social history is emphasized throughout.

- 14. Understand the ways in which the United States contributed to globalization, as well as the ways in which globalization affected the United States.
- 15. Trace the growth and development of the civil rights movement in the United States.
- 16. Discuss the situations and contributions of different ethnic groups, as well as women, in the twentieth and twenty-first centuries.
- 17. Analyze the ways in which industry and technology have affected American society.
- 18. Use maps, charts, data, primary sources, and secondary sources in historical studies.
- 19. Express personal views about social, economic, and political matters.
